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"Comparative perspectives on education in Europe" - 90 min. x 2 times = 4 academic hours

The course unit aims at sharing and discussing different perspectives on education and teaching in Europe, to take full advantage of the rich variety of knowledge, cultures and experiences brought by the participants. References to recent European policies and recommendations concerning education and teaching will be embedded within a comparative framework of analysis, considering national educational systems and practices from an ecological perspective. Expected outcomes of seminars will consist in enhanced understandings of similarities and distinctive traits across a variety of European contexts and cultures of education.

Tasks for course unit participants

Consider key features of your education system, which can reflect national perspectives on the main aims of schooling, the roles of the teacher, and the ideal citizen in your country, summed up in the following questions:

- what is a good teacher like?
- what is a good citizen like?
- what is a good school like?

Then choose one of the following documents (enclosed in PDF format in the attached folder), and find relevant connections between European recommendations or studies and strengths or issues of education in your country.

Prepare a very short powerpoint presentation (5 minutes) on the above tasks results. You can prepare it in pairs or groups with your country's fellow students, if feasible.
